

Grand Lodge and Grand Chapter to Rededicate Lakewood Masonic Temple Sunday October 30

Our Lakewood Masonic Temple was dedicated by the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Ohio on Saturday, September 30, 1916, with Past Right Worshipful Grand Master Edwin S. Griffiths officiating.

The dedication was the beginning of a week-long series of Grand Opening events. On Sunday, October 1, Professor Albert Riemenschneider performed a recital on the new Votteler-

Holtkamp-Sparling tubular pneumatic pipe organ in our strikingly beautiful new Lodge Room. Monday, October 2, was the first meeting of Lakewood Lodge #601 F&AM in our new Lodge Room. Tuesday, October 3, was Stockholders Night (for historic legal reasons, Temple companies were for-profit corporations a century ago). On Wednesday, October 4, Lincoln Chapter #309 OES met in our new Temple for the first time, followed on Thursday, October 5, by Cunningham Chapter #187 RAM and on Friday, October 6, by Gaston G. Allen Lodge #629 F&AM. The Grand Opening celebration culminated on Saturday, October 7, with an Opening Ball—in our Ballroom, of course!

Over the past year and a half

we've been retracing the events from Groundbreaking and Cornerstone Laying to Grand Opening. (Well, we've actually been building up to this, our Centennial Celebration, for a hundred years!)

Much has changed over the past century, but much has not. Temple companies such as ours are now not-for-profit corporations rather than for-profit as a result of clarifications in the law. Our Lodge Room pipe organ is still as original and still works, and our Lodge Room is still strikingly beautiful! And our need for your support continues. Appreciated Assets As One-Time Gifts

With stock markets once again approaching their all-time highs, the opportunity to make gifts in the form of appreciated assets becomes more attractive to many donors.

There are various reasons to use appreciated assets to make one-time gifts to an organization such as The Lakewood Masonic Foundation. Chief among them are the sense of personal satisfaction you will achieve from making a special gift and the likely benefit you will receive from the unique tax breaks for this type of gift.

A gift of an appreciated asset often provides you with a greater tax benefit than a gift of cash. For example, a gift of appreciated stock that you have held for more than 12 months can be deducted at its current value if you itemize deductions, and you won't have to pay capital gains tax on the appreciated portion of your gift. As always, you are encouraged to consult with your legal and tax advisors before making a gift of this type.

There are two ways to use appreciated assets—such as stocks, bonds, mutual fund shares, real estate and insurance policies—to make a special gift. One option is to donate the asset outright, meaning that it would be transferred immediately from you to The Lakewood Masonic Foundation. Another option is to fund a lifetime income gift, which will provide you with income for your lifetime or for some other specified period of time. If you prefer to make a more straightforward gift, you may simply write a check using the form in our newsletter (see page 11), by responding to our letter appeals or by adding a donation to your annual dues.

You may designate your gift or bequest to be used for our historic preservation, educational or charitable purposes; split your gift among these purposes; or simply ask that your gift be devoted to our greatest need. All gifts, other than a small percentage spent for printing and mailing, are used for our stated purposes.

Your donation is a special way of showing your love for our Lakewood Masonic Family and for our historic home. Our 2016 Centennial is upon us, and we still have lots of catch-up maintenance to complete on our facilities.

While gifts and bequests may be directed to our Lakewood Masonic Foundation, our Lakewood Masonic Temple Endowment Fund or our Lakewood Masonic Temple Company Operating Fund, please note that only gifts and bequests to our Lakewood Masonic Foundation are deductible for federal income and estate taxes to the extent permitted by law. Gifts to our Endowment and Operating Funds are not deductible; but, depending on your tax situation, deductibility may not be an issue for you.



Master's Message

Anyone with an above average Lodge attendance record, and who has traveled, would be able to tell you that different Lodges look different all around the world. And while our customs and traditions are the ties that bind us, it is our differences that make our art beautiful. The melody of our song is in our Ritual and Constitutions, the counterpoint is in our execution and style.

As Brothers, we should always welcome each other's perspectives, interests or points of view, as they help us grow and complement our own, like harmony in a song. But we must be careful that, among Masons and non-Masons alike, and on social media, the public doesn't mistake your solo piece for the song of the Craft. The song of the Craft is major and minor, forte and piano. Our song is sung when our voices sing in chorus with those who came before us, passing along their words to our attentive ears and keeping their character and memory in our hearts.

Remember, love each other, exercise the muscles of understanding, and treat all persons you meet as if they are under our chivalrous care.

Music

One of the seven liberal arts and sciences, whose beauties are inculcated in the Fellow Craft's Degree. Music is recommended to the attention of Freemasons, because as the "concord of sweet sounds" elevates the generous sentiments of the soul, so should the concord of good feeling reign among the Brethren, that by the union of friendship and brotherly love the boisterous passions may be lulled and harmony exist throughout the Craft.

Master's Message

Companions:

This is our 100th anniversary of Masonry in this beautiful Temple. I hope all of you have a chance to participate in the functions planned for this occasion.

We will once again start the year with a Table Council on September 7; hope to see all Council members present. The Grand Council will meet on the first week of October, and so the new year begins. I am looking forward to seeing all of you. Let's make this our best year ever.

Hours, Masonic

The language of Freemasonry, in reference to the hours of labor and refreshment, is altogether symbolical. The old lectures contained a tradition that our ancient Brethren wrought six days in the week and twelve hours in the day, being called off regularly at the hour of high twelve from labor to refreshment. In the French and German systems, the Craft were said to be called from labor at low twelve, or midnight, which is therefore the supposed or fictitious time at which a French or German Lodge is closed. But in the English and American systems the Craft are supposed to be called off at high twelve, and when called on again the time for recommencing labor is said to be "one hour past high twelve"; all this refers to Ancient Craft Freemasonry. In some of the advanced Degrees the hours designated for labor or rest are different. So, too, in the different Rites: thus, in the system of Zinnendorf, it is said that there are in a Mason's Lodge five hours, namely, twelve struck, noon, high noon, midnight, and high midnight; which are thus explained: Twelve struck, is before the Lodge is opened and after it is closed; noon is when the Master is about to open the Lodge; high noon, when it is duly open; midnight, when the Master is about to close it; and high midnight, when it is closed and the uninitiated are permitted to draw near.



Shield

The shape of the shield worn by the knight in the Middle Ages varied according to the caprice of the wearer, but generally it was large at the top and gradually diminished to a point, being made of wood and covered with leather, and on the outside was seen the escutcheon or representation of the armorial bearings of the owner. The shield, with all the other parts of the armor worn by the knights except the gauntlets, has been discontinued by the modern Masonic Knights. Doctor Oliver thinks that in some of the military initiations, as in those of the Scandinavian mysteries, the shield was substituted for the apron. An old heraldic writer, quoted by Sloane-Evans (*Grammar of British Heraldry*, page 153), thus gives the symbolic import of the shield: "Like as the shield served in the battle for a safeguard of the body of soldiers against wounds, even so in time of peace, the same being hanged up, did defend the owner against the malevolent detractions of the envious."

President's Message

Cleveland Assembly No. 15 was instituted on April 29, 1921, making this the Assembly's 95th year. It is also the oldest Assembly east of the Mississippi River. The Social Order of the Beauceant was formed as an organization for the wives and widows of Knights Templar but over the years has expanded its membership to women eighteen years or older who are the wives, widows, mothers, sisters, daughters, or granddaughters of Knights Templar of the United States of America; or mothers, sisters, daughters and granddaughters of a member who was at the time of decease in good standing in a Commandery or an Assembly.

The main charity of the Order is the Knights Templar Eye Foundation; however, Cleveland Assembly has other charities that it supports. Individual members also express their love for mankind by their contribution to other charities of their personal choice.

During the summer, the Lunch Bunch gathered at the home of Mrs. (Grant) Bonnie Rollason for the annual picnic. Pro Grand Master

The Latin word *pro* to be translated *for*, or *instead of*, or *on behalf of* the Grand Master. An officer known only to the English system, and the title adopted for the first time in 1782, when, on the election of the Duke of Cambridge to the office of Grand Master, a regulation was adopted by the Grand Lodge of England, that whenever a Prince of the Blood accepted the office of Grand Master, he should be at liberty to nominate any peer of the realm to be the Acting Grand Master, and to this officer is now given the title of *Pro Grand Master*. His collar, jewel and authority are the same as those of a Grand Master, and in the case of a vacancy he actually assumes the office until the next annual election . . .

Dedication of the Temple

There are five dedications of the Temple of Jerusalem which are recorded in Jewish history:

1. The dedication of the Solomonic Temple, 1004 B.C.
2. The dedication in the time of Hezekiah, when it was purified from the abominations of Ahaz, 726 B.C.
3. The dedication of Zerubbabel's Temple, 513 B.C.
4. The dedication of the Temple when it was purified after Judas Maccabaeus had driven out the Syrians, 164 B.C.
5. The dedication of Herod's Temple, 22 B.C.

The fourth of these is still celebrated by the Jews in their *Feast of the Dedication*. The first only is connected with the Masonic ritual, and is commemorated in the Most Excellent Master's Degree of the American Rite as the *Celebration of the Capstone*. This dedication was made by King Solomon in the Year of the World 3000, and lasted eight days, commencing in the month of Tisri, 15th day, during the Feast of the Tabernacles. The dedication of the Temple is called in the English system of Lectures, *the third grand offering which consecrates the floor of a Mason's Lodge*. The same Lectures contain a tradition that on that occasion King Solomon assembled the nine Deputy Grand Masters in the holy place, from which all natural light had been carefully excluded, and which only received the artificial light which emanated from the east, west, and south, and there made the necessary arrangements. The legend must be considered as a myth; but the inimitable prayer and invocation which were offered up by King Solomon on the occasion are recorded in the eighth chapter of the First Book of Kings, which contains the Scriptural account of the dedication.

Superintendent of Works, Grand

An officer of the Grand Lodge of England, who is appointed annually by the Grand Master. He should be well skilled in geometry and architecture. His duty is to advise with the Board of General Purposes on all plans of building or edifices undertaken by the Grand Lodge, and furnish plans and estimates for the same; to superintend their construction, and see that they are conformable to the plans approved by the Grand Master, the Grand Lodge, and the Board of General Purposes; to suggest improvements, and make an annual report of the condition of all Grand Lodge edifices. The office is not known in the Grand Lodges of the United States, but where there is a temple or hall belonging to a Grand Lodge, the duty of attending to it is referred to a hall committee, which, when necessary, engages the services of a professional architect.
